

On Miller's Head Overlook, Roy Sullivan hunkers down inside a fire lookout tower as the storm shreds through the skies. Lightning strikes the lookout once, twice, seven times! The lookout is fairly new and the protective lightning rods will not be installed until next week. The structure begins to burn, and Sullivan runs, fearing that it's no longer safe to hide inside.

But, just as Sullivan makes it out, lightning cracks from the sky like a heat-seeking missile. Sullivan is struck by lightning, knocking him off his feet and burning a hole through his shoe but otherwise leaving him intact.

Lightning, of course, does not have a mind of its own. It is caused when so much static electricity builds up inside a cloud that a giant spark of electricity flows between the cloud and the ground. This spark of electricity is around 30,000°C, five times the temperature of the surface of the Sun.

In order to combat the constant strikes of lightning, Sullivan began carrying around a flask of water. Of course, water cannot protect you from lightning, but it did help to put out his hair, which frequently caught fire after being struck. In fact, two of Sullivan's hats are kept in museums, and you can see where the lightning entered his body through the burn holes.

What terrible luck! Anyone would start to feel like the universe was out to get them. And Sullivan certainly did. That being said, annually, around 24,000 people die due to being struck by lightning. Though Sullivan was struck by lightning many times during his lifetime, he still lived to tell the tale!


