If you think about Pablo Picasso, you might envision his groundbreaking experiments with Cubism, characterized by their unconventional shapes and vibrant colours. Perhaps you think about Guernica, one of his best known paintings. Or maybe you recall his deeply emotional blue period, during which he painted in various shades of blue following the tragic death of his friend. However, before Picasso achieved worldwide fame and developed his signature confident and self-assured persona as an artist, his name made headlines for an entirely different reason.

Picasso found himself thrust into the spotlight due to the notorious theft of Leonardo da Vinci's masterpiece, the Mona Lisa, from the Louvre Museum in 1911. The authorities suspected that the young Picasso might be somehow involved in the heist. This suspicion stemmed from the fact that Picasso had previously been gifted two stolen statues from the Louvre. Given these circumstances, it was only natural for the police to want to question him.

During the subsequent court hearing, Picasso was visibly distraught and even shed tears in front of the judge. It is understandable that a young artist might be distressed to be accused of the theft of such an important piece of art. This vulnerable and emotional side of Picasso contrasts sharply with the image we have of him as a confident and prideful artist.

The true culprit behind the theft remained a mystery until 1913 when he was apprehended while attempting to sell the painting to a gallery in Italy. The resolution of the case must have been an immense relief for young Picasso, finally clearing his name of any involvement in the crime. Is it any wonder that after such a dramatic brush with infamy, Picasso went on to cement his status as one of the most influential and renowned artists of the 20th century?
